President's Report

A Year of Hard Work, Achievement and Celebration

We began with renewal of the management committee: a new president, secretary, new ordinary members and, by November, a new treasurer. Our first task was a strategic plan to take Access Arts through 2014, 2015 and 2016. The management committee's draft plan was strong on vision and true to our roots. After consultation with staff, the fully formed draft was circulated to members for comments. A members' consultation day was held in November 2013. The final plan was posted in December 2013, in time for the New Year to begin. It could not have been accomplished without the very generous contributions of time and

thought from our members, staff, board and our external pro bono advisers Hamish Doley of KPMG and Dr Rosemary Howell of Strategic Action.

Of course, all our plans depend upon Access Arts securing funding sufficient to create opportunities and remove barriers to engagement with the arts for our members and the community generally. It has been our very good fortune to have such loyal funders. It is our goal to have a few more.

In late October, our hard work in planning was rewarded when Arts Queensland approved Organisations Funding for Access Arts for the next three years. This supports the engine room that keeps our programs, services and projects running. In their assessment, Arts Queensland and the Arts Investment Advisory Board recognised the quality of the artistic work of our members, our community engagement, the reach and valued

benefits of our work and our strong governance, resilience and viability as an



organisation. Although we share with many arts organisations some reduction in organisational funding, we fared well overall and greatly appreciate the support and encouragement that Arts Queensland's decision represents for us. We look forward to continuing to work with Arts Queensland, drawing on their assistance as we develop partnerships with other community organisations and links to philanthropic supporters and other sponsors over the next three years.

In July, in partnership with Arts Queensland, the Rising Star project entitled *Tiny Little* Lies allowed 23 talented artists and practitioners with and without disability to come together from as far afield as Cairns and Coolangatta, Mackay and Nambour, for a one and a half day master class led by Adelaide-based artist Gaelle Mellis, who proudly defines herself as an artist with disability. The participants shared some of their creative work with an audience at the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts on the evening of 23 July 2013. Bursary funds for further professional development were distributed to two artists with disability as part of the project: to Racheal Missingham to explore circus artist skills in Victoria, Canada and the UK; and to Deb Chilton to support her Ipswich-based ArtISability program.

At about the same time, our entire human and physical infrastructure moved from Dutton Park to our new home at Teneriffe. We were very pleased to welcome the Hon. Tracy Davis MP, Minister for Communities, Child Safety and Disability, to officially "cut the ribbon". Bust-A-Move performed a routine for the Minister in the new rehearsal space. Our friends from OATSIH, KPMG, State Library of Queensland, ArtsLink, Silverstone, and our colleagues from Vulcana Women's Circus, Queensland Ballet, and Ausdance Queensland were able to be present. Damian Stewart on the keyboard and vocals by Peter Vance and Janelle Colguhoun provided a musical welcome, while Magda Labuda and Colleen Stevenson of the Camera Wonderers documented the event, and Alex Crombie and Belinda Peel created artworks through live painting to mark the occasion.

We continue to value the substantial on-going contribution of the Department of Communities, Child Safety and Disability Services to our work, supporting our community arts workshops, artists' professional development and other activities. Their outstanding support has made a very significant difference to our work.

In August we underwent a full audit of our policies and This audit review was a full re-certification procedures. assessment against all six standards of the new Human Services Quality Framework (HSQF) by external auditor Globalmark. The quality standards in the HSQF are based on the principles of respecting human rights, social inclusion, participation and choice. Access Arts was awarded certification for the next three years. The Access Arts staff (past and present) and board member Susan Ball are to be congratulated on this excellent result.

In 2013, our long-standing relationship with Australian Government's Office of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health (OATSIH) was renewed for a further financial year. The Commonwealth program may come to an end on 30 June 2014. Under the program Access Arts has been able to deliver a range of projects ourselves and in collaboration with indigenous organisations. We are grateful for the work of the many members, supporters, collaborators and staff members, and very proud of the extraordinary body of work that has been produced by indigenous artists during this long and fruitful relationship.

Access Arts continued to enjoy an ongoing relationship with McCullough Robertson Lawyers in Brisbane's CBD which enables our artists to exhibit their work on a rotating basis. In 2013 artists George Delaney, Colleen Stevenson, Irene Martin-Miller and Dion Halse exhibited their artwork in the McCullough Robertson foyer.

We also acknowledge the invaluable support of Shadow Breakers and KPMG in 2013. Shadow Breakers and KPMG jointly made a significant difference to Access Arts, helping us to raise our profile in the business community and offering us the opportunity to hold a profile-raising exhibition of our visual artists' artwork called *Colours of Change*, which opened last August in KPMG's prestigious offices in the CBD and hung for three months.

In September and November, we lost two early and important members of the Access Arts family, Liz Navratil and Di Hill. Very different from each other, they were two of the pillars that held Access Arts upright through its first decades. In the context of remembering with gratefulness these remarkable women, the time arrived to celebrate an important anniversary – Access Arts' 30th.

The many branches of the Access Arts family came together at the Brisbane Powerhouse, itself part of our history. Aunty Delmae Barton and William Barton offered the very special welcome to country and led the birthday celebration with a



performance of *Didge Fusion*. Our Patron, Her Excellency Ms Penelope Wensley AC spoke about her interest in our work of promoting human rights and excellence in the arts, and expressed a keen understanding of our mission to support people experiencing disability or disadvantage to pursue their ambitions in the arts. The Hon. Ian Walker MP, Minister for Science, Information Technology, Innovation and the Arts, spoke warmly about our history and our work. After the formalities, vocal, instrumental and performance artist members entertained and challenged the audience in the Visy Theatre and upstairs in the Turbine Hall, where visual artists displayed their work. It was a night for sharing appreciation, laughter, talk, tears and memories.

In November we were able to announce the Access Artists Achievement Award, which will offer \$10,000 funding for the professional career of one talented Queensland artist who experiences disability. This new and prestigious Award is open to all Queensland artists with disability, working in any artform, and will run annually for the next five years. It is a result of the vision and financial generosity of Life Member and performer Peter Vance.



- In 2013 Over 30 artists with disability took part in Access Arts artists' professional development program for emerging artists. Our artists developed their practice across the art forms film, theatre, literature, music, circus, photography and visual arts; and were based across Queensland: Cairns, Ipswich, the Sunshine Coast, Gold Coast, Rockhampton and Greater Brisbane.
- February John Briggs achieved his artistic goal, successfully launching his first solo exhibition *Unframed* at the Jugglers Art Space gallery in Fortitude Valley, through the support of an Access Arts SAFE grant.
- March Peter Hughes was selected to exhibit his artwork Earthquake in Japan as part of the Heart Art Show, coordinated by Variety - the Children's Charity of Queensland. This exhibition at Jugglers Art Space auctioned donated artwork and raised money for Queensland children in need.
- April Alex Crombie launched her fifth solo exhibition Art Stuff at the Gardens. Alex's exhibition was held at the Richard Randall Art Studio, Mount Coot-tha Botanic Gardens. In association with Art Stuff at the Gardens Alex was interviewed on ABC Radio and by The Courier-Mail.

- May Thirteen of Access Arts artists exhibited work as part of the Mental Illness Fellowship Queensland Exhibition held in King George Square. Exhibiting artists included Lisa Blake, Tanya Darl, Peter Hughes, Jerome Twigg, George Delaney, Dion Halse, Andrew Pemberton, Michael Mulvey, Alex Jack, Marten Forrest, Cybele Borel de Bitche, Levi Diball and Roy Close.
- May Five young Indigenous musicians from Inala took part in a Recording Project, a professional development program that extended their artistic and
 - creative practice. The project gave them the opportunity to record broadcast-quality music through the Stylin' Up Festival, with Australian Government funding through the Office of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health.
- June we joined the Queen's Birthday celebrations at Government House. Integrated theatre company InsideOutside Theatre came dressed as faeries and Greek nobles inspired by A Midsummer Night's Dream. They roved as performers, ran workshops and showcased their talents, and several pieces of artwork by our BOA artists were sold from our market stall.

- June Our mid-year showcase called A Time to Celebrate! saw some 30 members performing and exhibiting their work to a packed audience of 80 people. Our twice-yearly showcases are part of our year-round program of community workshops held across Brisbane and Redcliffe that were attended by 67 people with disability in 2013.
- July New workshop partnerships in 2013 included Horizons Respite and Vulcana Women's Circus. The partnership with Vulcana Women's Circus was a 16-week workshop program, titled Stronghold which engaged 10 Access Arts members, giving them the opportunity to learn skills in the areas of puppetry, performance, circus and theatre. The program concluded with a show



that was performed as part of Access Arts 30th Anniversary celebration at Brisbane Powerhouse.

- July The Rising Star project *Tiny Little Lies* was a partnership with Arts Queensland. South Australian artist Gaelle Mellis led a master class that drew artists with and without disability from across Queensland and culminated in a public showing of the work at the Judith Wright Centre of Contemporary Arts.
- August Access Arts was given the opportunity to curate an exhibition featuring
 artists with disability at KPMG in Brisbane's CBD. For this project eleven
 members were commissioned to produce paintings and photographs, exploring
 their unique artistic style in vibrant autumn colours. The artists collaboratively
 selected the title *Colours of Change* to indicate how art making has created
 positive changes in their lives. *Colours of Change* remained on display for a 3
 month period and 6 pictures were sold.

- September To mark Disability Action Week and following our office move in July, Access Arts' new office in Teneriffe was officially opened by the Hon. Tracy Davis MP, Minister for Communities, Child Safety and Disability, at an exceptional breakfast packed with music, song, theatre and visual arts displays by our talented artists.
- September Access Arts Camera Wonderers exhibited at the QUT Theatre Republic as part of Brisbane Festival. Featured photographers included Magda Labuda, Colleen Stevenson, Matthew Lys, Luke Cowan, Brendan Huddy and Robert Walmsley-Evans.

- September Eleven Access Arts members exhibited their artwork as part of the Art from the Margins Exhibition. Artworks were exhibited in two venues: Brisbane Institute of Art (BIA) and Wesley House in Brisbane City. Several of Access Arts artists were award winners: Lisa Blake, Stephen Corti-Griffiths and Tanya Darl were recipients of the Heiser Gallery Emerging Artist Award, Peter Hughes received a Commended Award and Colleen Stevenson won the PBS building award.
- October Our Artist Space workshop participants exhibited their artwork as part of the Stages of Life group exhibition in Fortitude Valley at Jugglers Art Space.

- October Access Arts enabled InsideOutside Theatre Company's Artistic Director Angela Witcher to run a master class in Mackay to support the Dancing Together Initiative, a Latin Dance program being developed for young people with disability.
- November Body Language, an exhibition celebrating the artwork of 22 indigenous schoolgirls who came from rural and remote Queensland to attend school. The exhibition was attended by some 200 family members, community members and key Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander representatives. The exhibition was a poignant culmination of a partnership made possible through OATSIH funding between Access Arts, Kambu Health, BoysTown, Ipswich Girls' Grammar and Ipswich City Council.

- November Let's Talk, a time when Access Arts' members

 the forthcoming three years.
- November Community Café, a conversation for performing artists with disability and arts workers who work with performing artists with disability, about their work and the future of the sector in Queensland. The Community Café was facilitated by Erica Rose Jeffrey and Tim Foote from PaCSIA, who guided the 22 participants through a series of questions that were discussed in small groups.

- December Body Image Project Art Exhibition, celebrating the torso artwork of ten brave and talented indigenous women who completed their individual "Body Image Story" in a project led by indigenous artist Janette Evans. Several of the women participating in this partnership between The Healing Centre Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Centre Health Service Brisbane and Access



Arts, made possible through OATSIH funding, were women from the Stolen Generation.

December – Access Arts joined in the State Library of Queensland's celebrations for the International Day of People with Disability at The Edge Auditorium. DJ Jammers David Truong and Jack Murphy performed, as did the Kayzee Sisters Karen Lee Roberts and Tara Heard who formed the duo through Access Arts' mentorship program, while Access Arts' market stall sold several pieces of artwork created by our visual artists.
